Aimee Mullins (born <u>1976</u> in <u>Allentown, Pennsylvania</u>) is an American <u>athlete</u>, <u>actress</u>, and <u>fashion model</u> best known for her extraordinary collegiate-level athletic accomplishments, despite a disability that resulted in the amputation of both of her legs.

Mullins was born with <u>fibular hemimelia</u> (missing <u>fibula</u> bones) and had both of her legs amputated below the knee when she was just a year old. She is a graduate of <u>Parkland</u> <u>High School</u> in Allentown and <u>Georgetown University</u> in <u>Washington, D.C.</u>.

While attending Georgetown University she competed against able-bodied athletes in <u>NCAA</u> Division I <u>track and field</u> events and set <u>Paralympic</u> records in <u>1996</u> in <u>Atlanta</u> in the 100-meter dash and the <u>long jump</u>. Her personal bests are: 15.77 seconds for the 100-meter dash, 34.60 seconds for the 200 meter, and 3.5 meters for the long-jump.

Also while at Georgetown, Mullins won a place on the Foreign Affairs <u>internship</u> program, working at <u>The Pentagon</u>. She also makes appearances as a motivational speaker.

Fashion model
